#### Arrival in Yaoundé Cameroon

On July 18th, we arrived in Yaoundé after 18 hours in airplanes. We had uneventful flights except that, when we arrived in Yaoundé, one of our pieces of lugguage got lost in Paris. It caught up with us about 10 days later.

Life in the capital city of Yaoundé is much different from our other African experiences. For example, it isn't so hot here with an elevation of 3,000 feet, plus so far no mosquitoes are getting in the house so we don't have to sleep under mosquito nets. The city is much bigger, and the roads are wide with very few potholes. The downside of this is that people drive very fast and are constantly passing each other which ends up making four lanes out of two. Pedestrians crowd



the sides of the road and dodge in and out of traffic. Driving is a bit frightening, and since we don't have our own car, we usually take taxis, which thankfully are very inexpensive. A taxi ride only costs about 40 cents, but you have to share it with four other people.

### What are we doing here?

Michael is the finance manager for the Rain Forest International school (RFIS). He works with several Cameroonian men. Jonah Mabu, who is the school cashier taking in tuition and selling school supplies and books to the students and Norbert Tchoukeu (see the back page), the administrative assistant who buys calculators, cell phones, and whatever the teachers need, as well as dealing with government offices to obtain residence papers for the teachers to be able to work in Cameroon.

The student body is a mix of 7th—12th grade students from all over Central Africa. Although the majority of the students are missionary kids, about 30% of the students are Cameroonians whose parents are not missionaries. It is fun getting to interact with the students. Michael is part of the running club, which runs twice a week. Those in the running club get the privilege of going on the school trip to climb Mount Cameroon—one of Africa's largest volcanoes, which has an elevation of 13,255 feet. The trip takes place in the spring. Michael is also working with another teacher in getting a video-production club started for the high school students.
