

Back across the ocean waves!!

Yes, we're still here at JAARS in North Carolina where Michael is serving in the computer department while we wait for the unrest in Congo to settle. However, with the doors of Congo still closed to our returning our director has begun making plans for our group to enter Gabon for the first time. Gabon is a small country just to the northwest of Congo, on the coast. Michael and I feel led to help with this new advance into Gabon in anyway we can.

There is so much to share regarding this new direction we are heading. Where do we begin?



Our Congo branch has always been the Congo/Gabon branch but the lack of personnel has prevented us from beginning work in Gabon. When we first arrived in Congo in '96 and I learned that our Congo branch was also responsible for Gabon, I had a strong feeling that some day Michael and I would live and work in Gabon. I believe that this "feeling" was a gift from the Lord to help me face yet another change, another move, another starting over, knowing that this is where He wants us to go.

Our Director's reports, following his visits into Gabon, have been very encouraging.

The Lord has truly been preparing the way for Bible translation to begin in Gabon.

- 1. The government policy has changed from promoting the use of only French in the schools to wanting the local Gabonese languages used in the schools and promoting literacy in the mother tongues of the people. This has always been a goal for Wycliffe believing that the Bible speaks clearest in a person's first language. Pray that this door remains open with the possibility of a new government (and new policies) being elected in December.
- 2. The development of a linguistics department at the University. Ten years ago no linguistic department even existed. The professors whom our director has contacted are very supportive of us coming and teaching them what we know. Pray that the Lord will raise up Godly Bible translators from among these already gifted linguistic students.
- 3. The pastors whom our director has met with have told him of their own goals for Bible translation even before they knew we were coming!! How exciting to be a part of what the Lord is doing in Bible translation for those who wait for His word in Gabon!! We look forward to sharing more of how the Lord is working in Gabon in the years to come. We pray you too can feel the excitement of what God is doing and will do through Bible translation!





Being among the first few to arrive in Gabon, we will need to fill several different roles.

Some of the roles our director has mentioned for Michael include e-mail coordinator, bookkeeper/accountant, survey trainer, and software instructor for linguistic students at the University. My roles are less defined at this point but I will help out wherever I can. Since David is only 2 years old he will not be in school yet and will still demand much of my time. I miss being more directly involved in "the work" but I must remember that David will grow up oh too quickly and there will be many years left when I can be more involved.

E.T.A?

In our most recent coorespondence with our director he estimates that we could be in Gabon by January or February. Presently he is planning a visit to Gabon in November to work out the details of our contract with the government.
