Good News and Bad News!

Good news: The civil war in Congo is over for now and we pray it will last.

Bad news: All our stuff was stolen, from clothes and dishes to the refrigirator and stove, even the bathroom sink and toilet! We had suspected this might happen, but now we have eye witness comfirmation of it.

We had left Congo for our furlough on June 3rd, just two days before the war broke out. We had planned to return in October after only four months in the US so we packed lightly. We left all household and personal items behind. Most of it can be replaced, except the sentimental things like David's baby book, quilts his grandma, greatgrandma and aunt made for him, and other keepsakes.

This is one hard example of the Lord's teaching us to not store up for ourselves treasures on earth where moth and rust can distroy them, but rather store up treasures in heaven. (Matthew 6:19-21.)

Yes, we are hoping to return. Even though there's been a war with thousands killed and it may take the country years to rebuild to what it was before, there is still a need for Bible translation and so we make plans to return as soon as it is deemed safe to do so.

It can be a bit disheartening to think about accumulating, organizing and packing all we need once again. After doing it four years ago I had breathed a sigh of relief that I only had to do it once, or so I thought.

Wycliffe has set up a special project on our behalf to cover the cost of restarting in Congo. If you would like to give to this project, the Wycliffe address is on the back page. Often Asked Questions

- Q How long do you plan to be in the States? Are you planning on going back to Congo?
- A Our original plans (as you may remember) were to go back Oct '97. We are now planning on being here until June '98. After that, our plans are still very much undetermined. We are currently discussing the options with our leaders in Wycliffe.
- Q Are you receiving a salary from Wycliffe while you are here in the States?
- A No, we continue to live as we have for the past four years, relying on God to provide for our needs through faithful supporting churches and individuals. All Wycliffe missionairies whether overseas or in the States live this way.
- Q If the war is over, why are your plans so sketchy as to going back to Congo?
- A Although the war is over, there are still many militia roaming the streets. Our director recently made a trip back into Brazzaville and talked with many Congolese pastors and leaders as well as the US Ambassador to Congo who was there visiting also. All the counsel he received indicated that the time to move back into Brazzaville had not yet come, but possibly we could go to another city in Congo instead.
