The Gabonese elections were held in early December and the voters re-elected their same president of the past 30 years. Thank you for praying for peaceful elections. Our director was able to visit the country in mid-January and sign an agreement with GRELACO, a government agency for the preservation of African languages which is associated with the University of Omar Bongo in Libreville. This has paved the way for us to work in the country of Gabon. The director is currently in the capital of Libreville looking for housing for his family and also a small guest house for new people arriving. He is hoping to move his family to Libreville in early March and we are to arrive April 1st.

David's Health Update

Test results for allergies show that David is allergic to milk, eggs and cheese and has food sensitivities to wheat, corn, beef, pineapple, banana, rye and sesame. We are in the process of eliminating these from his diet for 8 weeks with the hopes of rotating those he is sensitive to back into his diet occasionally.


New Challenges

The time is drawing near to leave for Libreville. I am excited about finally getting back overseas. A new city, new culture, new jobs. I have been asked to do the accounting for the Congo/Gabon branch which will be a new experience for me. Occasionally I find myself wondering, will I be able to do it? Will I enjoy it? I will be getting a crash course in accounting during the first three weeks of March and hopefully at that time I will be able to take over the branch's books.

I will also be helping to set up a networked computer lab at the University in Libreville and may be training Gabonese linguists in some linguistic software that we use. This will also be a challenge.

Finally, I also hope to be taking part in surveying the sociolinguistic situation in the country or perhaps just training others in sociolinguistic issues. Many of the Gabonese linguists have studied in France and some have their doctorate degrees. It is a little frightening thinking I may be training them! I know I enjoy survey but will I have the time to do it in light of my other tasks?

There are many questions and unknowns as we head over to Gabon and I though may sometimes lack confidence in my abilities, I can always have confidence in God who will help me in each and every situation. As the children's song goes, "We are weak but He is strong, Yes Jesus loves me!"



It seems the theme of my life since joining Wycliffe has been "Push through the fear". It all began in Dallas taking the linguistic courses. The Lord encouraged me through the words David spoke to Solomon when building the temple. "Do not be discouraged, do not fear, but DO THE WORK."

I Chronicles 28:20. With God all things are possible! The next great fear came when I was expected to speak in front of churches. Once again I had to push through the fear and DO THE WORK.
